Directors



LEO GENE PETERS (MTA 2004 Toi Whakaari/VUW) has most recently been directing/touring **Don Juan** (Edinburgh Fringe, UK, NZ) and **Jekyll & Hyde** (Tourmakers NZ Tour,

Edinburgh Fringe). He's also directed/created **The Odyssey** (A Slightly Isolated Dog/CubaDupa18), **Alice** (ATC's Here & Now), **Black Confetti** by Eli Kent (Toi Whakaari 2017 Grad) and **Santa Claus** (Basement Xmas Show).

In 2014 he directed **One Day Moko**, from 2012-15 he wrote/directed several seasons/tours of **An Awfully Big Adventure** for Capital E. In 2011 he directed **Awhi Tapu** for TRP (Chapman Tripp Nominee: Best Director) and **Death and the Dreamlife of Elephants** at Downstage. He first directed **Elephants** for 2009 STAB at BATS and it received several Chapman Tripp Awards and Nominations, including Best Director.

From 2006-10 he directed Paolo Rotundo and Rob Mokaraka's **Strange Resting Places** for TRP (2007 Chapman Tripp Nominations: Most Promising New Director, Production of the Year).



In 2015 JANE YONGE graduated with a Master of Theatre Arts (MTA) in Directing from Victoria University and Toi Whakaari: New Zealand Drama School. In 2019

she graduated with a Masters in Arts Politics from New York University: Tisch School of the Arts on a Fulbright scholarship.

Peril by Nathan Joe (2022), Another Mammal by Jo Randerson (2021), 48 Nights on Hope Street (Auckland Theatre Company, 2020), Basement Theatre's 2019 Christmas Show, A Fricken Dangerous Space-mas, The Basement Tapes (Wellington Theatre Awards Best Director 2017, Scotsman Fringe First Award at the Edinburgh Festival Fringe 2018), At the Wake by Victor Roger (Circa Theatre 2018). Jane is an ISPA Fellow and the Creative Catalyst at Te Taumata Toi-a-lwi (Arts Regional Trust).

Performers



Since graduating from Toi Whakaari: New Zealand Drama School in 2013, JACK BUCHANAN has worked extensively in professional theatre throughout New Zealand. He has

acted in over thirty professional productions with many of New Zealand's most prominent theatre companies. Jack has been a key collaborator with A Slightly Isolated Dog since 2016, co-creating and performing in Don Juan, Jekyll & Hyde, Santa Claus, The Odyssey, Trojan War, Safety In Numbers, and Our Own Little Mess. Other stage highlights include Night of the Living Dead, Homos or Everyone In America, Cock, and Peer Gynt [Recycled].

Jack is also a writer and musician, and in 2020 he created the viral music video **Family Lockdown Boogie** which earned him international attention and has been viewed over 14 million times. Jack is one of the creative forces behind indie-rock band **Cheap Sav For Dead Friends**, and he releases his own alternative synth-pop under the name **Goblin Problem**.



LAUREL DEVENIE is an actor, director, and theatre-maker now based in Te Tai Tokerau. She is a graduate of Toi Whakaari: New Zealand Drama School and the John Bolton Theatre School,

and has been involved in professional and community arts organisations across the country including Auckland Theatre Company (Upside Down of the World, The Dolls House, The Importance of Being Earnest, and A Midsummer Night's Dream), Capital E and Downstage Theatre. She has served as a teacher or director for numerous organisations including Silo Theatre, Unitec, Prayas, Red Leap Theatre, Northland Youth Theatre, and Script to Screen. She was a core cast member on Shortland Street for four years.

She is the Founder and Director of Company of Giants, a Whangārei-based theatre collective known for productions like Odyssey, Giant Teeth, The Owl and the Pussycat, Rangitahua, Milk and Honey, and The Living Forest.

Laurel is also a co-founder of ONEONESIX, a community and performance venue in Whangārei that supports the development of both professional and community performing arts projects in Te Tai Tokerau. She is a Co-Founder and Director of the Whangārei Fringe Festival.



ISLA MAYO is a performer of mixed Chinese and Pākehā descent. She was raised in Tāmaki but also lived in Singapore and Japan growing up. She is most known for her recent work in

Silo Theatre's **Night of the Living Dead**. Isla is a graduate of The Actors' Program (2022) and for her graduation show, played one of the leads 'Nora' in Stef Smith's adaption of the classic play, **Nora: A Doll's House**. Isla has gone on to be a part of many theatre shows including **Not Woman Enough** (Proudly Asian Theatre) and **Love to Say Goodbye** (No.3 Roskill Theatre) where she devised her own piece of work. Aside from acting, Isla is also a skilled pianist and hip-hop/Latin dancer. She wishes to continue utilising her many skills to tell stories in Aotearoa and beyond!



ANDREW PATERSON graduated from Toi Whakaari: New Zealand Drama School — Acting in 2012. After graduating, Andrew has acted in a number of Wellington productions,

and has created and performed with A Slightly Isolated Dog in productions of **Don Juan**, **Jekyll & Hyde**, **Santa Claus** and **The Odyssey**. Other productions around New Zealand include **Isaac's Eye**, **King Lear**, **Orphans**, **The Angry Brigade**, **School Dance** and **Jeeves & Wooster**.
